# Profile of the Kamrup College

## **Brief Introduction of the College**

Kamrup College, Chamata, a premier and one of the oldest institution of Higher Education in West Nalbari area, was established in the year 1966 (July 25) with a great deal of assistance and support from the local community in Chamata and Belsor. Renowned thinkers and social reformers had the vision to create a higher education institution in West-Nalbari area keeping in mind the increased interest in education in Chamata and the surrounding areas. The establishment of this institute was greatly aided by the contributions of distinguished politicians and educators like Late Pramod Ch. Barman and Late Bishwa Goswami and Late Srikanta Dutta as well as social workers. The college initially held classes on the premises of Chamata Higher Secondary School in evening time. The college then relocated to its current campus in 1968. Beginning with 7 students, the college eventually was able to fetch 90 students with the assistance of Nalbari College right after. The number of students grows gradually, and there are currently about 2000. At first, the college ran classes with Late Chandra Talukdar and three other professors but no principal. Later, Late Chandra Kanta Mahanta joined as principal after his retirement as Cotton College's head of the Assamese department. Degree classes were started from 1969 and recognised by UGC in 1971. Additionally, the college received UGC grant-in-aid status in 1975.

At present the college is a provincialised college of the Government of Assam and recognized by University Grants Commission (UGC) and has 12(B) and 2(f) status. The college is affiliated to the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council (AHSEC) at the Higher Secondary level and to the Gauhati University at the undergraduate level. The college has been accredited by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) two times; first in 2005, with B+ grade (institutional score 78%) and second in 2016, with "A" grade (CGPA 3.04). While the college had only Arts Stream in earlier academic sessions, the Government of Assam granted Science Stream in the year 2022, which has been running since. The Open and Distance Learning (ODL) wing of the college serves as a recognized study center of Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University.

# **Methodology of Audit**

The inputs received from the departments as per the proforma (Annexure-1) have been validated from the supporting documents, interaction with the Head of the Department, and visits to the departments.

## • Curricular Aspects

Kamrup College, Nalbari is affiliated with Gauhati University. The College follows the curriculum developed by Gauhati University. For effective delivery of curriculum, the departments are maintaining lesson plans and course progress records. Departments follow the academic calendar of Gauhati University and the college has its own in alignment with Gauhati University's calendar.

## • Teaching learning aspects

Assessment of learning levels to identify slow and advanced learners is carried out through sessional examination, seminars, and assignments. Though the College follows students' centric learning method for effective curriculum delivery, however, a detailed unit-wise plan for experiential and participative learning needs to be maintained for enhancing the learning experiences of the students. The College maintains a mentoring system. All the conduct departments internal examinations the requirement of the affiliating University. The College incorporate more different modes for continuous internal evaluation.

Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes are described in the syllabus. Evaluation of the attainment of the learning outcomes to be evaluated properly.

## • Research, Innovation, and Extension

The college has started various research activities. However, the overall research culture in the College needs to be strengthened. Several departments are conducting very effective extension

activities. The involvement of the students in those activities should be encouraged.

#### • Infrastructure

The College has adequate infrastructure facilities for all academic and other extracurricular activities. The indoor and outdoor play area is adequate. The library and IT facilities need to be improved including increased internet bandwidth.

## • Student Support and Progression

Several departments conduct capacity-building and skill enhancement activities for the students. The placement of the students and progression to higher education is encouraging. Students need more encouragement for participation in extracurricular activities.

## Professional Development Activities

A few teachers have participated in the faculty development programs (FDP) and other professional programs. However, no professional programs have been organized/attended by the college for non teaching staffs. As faculty improvement is a continuous process, therefore, more teachers need to be participated in FDPs.

# Challenges

- Lack of teachers to maintain students teachers ratio

- Little scope for resource generation in the college
- Poor entry level performance of students in almost all the programs offered by the college
- To give placement to the pass-out students of the college
- Frequent "bandh" called by various organizations jeopardizing the teaching learning process in the college
- Poor vehicular communication for students belonging to remote areas

# Recommendations

- Few large classrooms need to be created with ICT facilities to conduct common classes to conduct the common courses for FYUGP.
- Outcome Based Education to be implemented for calculation of attainment level of the students.
- Students may be provided more experiential learning.
- The college needs to evolve a structured methodology for identifying the slow learners and remedial measures for their improvement based on outcome based education (OBE).
- The college may arrange a motivational lecture/counseling for the entire fresher at the beginning of the session.
- The teachers may be encouraged to enhance their research output, fund mobilization, consultancy services. To that end, the Principal may arrange brainstorming sessions time to time among the teachers to listen to their views and prepare a strategy for increasing research output of the teachers.
- Adequate ICT enabled class room facility may be made available to the academic departments.
- For effective delivery of curriculum, the course file of Academic departments should be assessed by IQAC.
- Research culture needs much improvement and multidisciplinary research to be initiated.
- More departments and students should be involved in the extension activities.

- More teachers should be participated in the FIP/FDP programs.
- Proper documentation is required for all activities.
- Best practices of individual departments should be identified and need to be institutionalized.
- Students and society need to be engaged while formulating policies specific to students' welfare and society.
- More collaboration needs to be established for faculty exchange, students exchange, internship etc.
- RFID based digitalization of the central library of the college
- Safety issues like fire extinguishers to be placed in some selected areas;
   distinct markings for emergency exits should be there in the multi-storied buildings.
- Master list of all the office related documents with document number and retention time, SOPs and vendors feedback need to maintain.


